GLOBAL DEBT FACILITY

Variable Rate Debt Securities Due February 1, 2011

This Pricing Supplement relates to the Debt Securities of the Federal Home Loan Mortgage Corporation ("Freddie Mac") described below and should be read in conjunction with the Offering Circular dated April 3, 2009 and all Incorporated Documents including Freddie Mac's Annual Report on Form 10-K for the year ended December 31, 2008, filed with the Securities and Exchange Commission on March 11, 2009. Capitalized terms used in this Pricing Supplement and not otherwise defined in this Pricing Supplement have the meanings given to them in the Offering Circular.

The Debt Securities are not suitable investments for all investors. In particular, no investor should purchase the Debt Securities unless the investor understands and is able to bear the yield, market and liquidity risks associated with the Debt Securities. See "Risk Factors - The Debt Securities May Not Be Suitable For You" in the Offering Circular.

The Debt Securities are obligations of Freddie Mac only. The Debt Securities, including any interest or return of discount on the Debt Securities, are not guaranteed by, and are not debts or obligations of, the United States or any agency or instrumentality of the United States other than Freddie Mac. Because of applicable U.S. securities law exemptions, we have not registered the Debt Securities with any U.S. federal or state securities commission. No U.S. securities commission has reviewed the Offering Circular or this Pricing Supplement.

The Debt Securities are not tax-exempt. Non-U.S. owners generally will be subject to the United States federal income and withholding tax unless they establish an exemption.

Any discussion of tax issues set forth in this Pricing Supplement and the related Offering Circular was written to support the promotion and marketing of the transactions described in this Pricing Supplement. Such discussion was not intended or written to be used, and it cannot be used, by any person for the purpose of avoiding any tax penalties that may be imposed on such person. RISK FACTORS

An investment in the Debt Securities entails certain risks not associated with an investment in conventional fixed rate debt securities. See “Risk Factors” generally and “Various Factors Could Adversely Affect the Trading Value and Yield of Your Debt Securities” in the Offering Circular. The interest rate of the Debt Securities will be equal to LIBOR for the Index Currency at the Index Maturity *minus* a Spread of 14 basis points (- 0.14 percentage points), subject to the “Interest Rate” provisions above. Investors should consider the risk that the variable interest rate on the Debt Securities may be less than that payable on a conventional fixed rate debt security issued by Freddie Mac at the same time. Because the Debt Securities may not pay a significant amount of interest for extended periods of time, the Debt Securities are not a suitable investment for individuals seeking a steady stream of income.

The secondary market for, and the market value of, the Debt Securities will be affected by a number of factors independent of the creditworthiness of Freddie Mac, including the level and direction of interest rates, the variable rate of interest payable on the Debt Securities, the anticipated level and potential volatility of LIBOR for the Index Currency at the Index Maturity, the method of calculating LIBOR for the Index Currency at the Index Maturity, the time remaining to the maturity of the Debt Securities, the aggregate principal amount of the Debt Securities and the availability of comparable instruments. The level of LIBOR for the Index Currency at the Index Maturity depends on a number of interrelated factors, including economic, financial and political events, over which Freddie Mac has no control. The following table, showing the level of LIBOR for the Index Currency at the Index Maturity in effect for the Hypothetical Determination Dates listed below, illustrates the variability of that rate:

Fluctuations in the level of 3-Month LIBOR make the Debt Securities interest rates difficult to predict and can result in actual interest rates to investors that are lower than anticipated. In addition, historical interest rates are not necessarily indicative of future interest rates. Fluctuations in interest rates and interest rate trends that have occurred in the past are not necessarily indicative of fluctuations that may occur in the future, which may be wider or narrower than those that have occurred historically.
